Multimodal text is a strategic use of two or more *communication modes* to make meaning

- ✤ It can be paper books, comics, posters, …
- It can be digital e-books, blogs, slide presentation, webpages,
 ...


<u>Learning objectives</u>

Writing tasks

- Engaging in a mini-project to pursue famous persons they admire
- Composing an e-book about 'My Dream Job'

Motivating students to write through creating and processing multimodal texts



Writing

Input from Reading Materials

- Ideas: the concept of goals and resolutions, qualities of a sports star and a star pupil
- Language: Use of imperatives to give instructions

Pre-writing Task: Form a sports team and think of the ways to become very, VERY fit.

> Writing Task: Create an e-book to be shown on the school Open Day on "How to be an Amazing Person"

Reading Tasks in 'How to be Sports Star'

- 1. Understanding the main ideas of the book using the cover and the blurb
- 2. Relating the book content to local context and connecting the topic to students' own experience
- 3. Helping students to understand the qualities of a good athlete
- 4. Understanding the importance of good planning in order to achieve goals
- 5. Learning the importance of good planning to achieve goals and keeping healthy both physically and mentally

Pre-writing Tasks for composing the e-book

Connecting reading and writing experience:

- 1. Using graphic organisers to identify the important qualities of famous people
- 2. Engaging in a mini project to pursue students' own dream



Rationale of our Literacy Programme

- Provide multimodal texts and connected learning experiences
- Develop higher order thinking skills, creativity and self-directed learning
- Adopt effective reading strategies such as
 - Reading Aloud & High Frequency Words
 - Making Connection between Ideas and Inference Skills
 - Identifying the main ideas and Making Conclusion

Considerations in Planning and Implementation

Effective Reading Skills and Strategies adopted

- Incorporate print (narrative text) and multimodal features of an interactive text to
 - encourage **prediction** of the content using trailers
 - work out the meaning of unfamiliar words by using syntactic / contextual / pictorial clues and knowledge of the world
 - identify details that support the mail idea
 - follow ideas by understanding the use of cohesive devices and making connection between ideas
- Understand intention, attitudes, feelings conveyed in the text by recognizing features such as the choice of vocabulary and use of language
