Consumer Goods Safety Ordinance

Introduction
The Consumer Goods Safety Ordinance was (1) on 20 October 1994. The
Ordinance imposes a (2) duty on manufacturers, importers and suppliers of

Regulations

(i) Use a good processing film

- A. The most important one is colour, which can vary slightly between different brands, but can be altered much more radically by the processing.
