





Example of Simulations with connectivity include:

- A Village of Solution This simulation connects participants to the multi-faceted challenge of development, within the fictional village of Kalumbut. An aid agency has offered to find solutions to problems such as a local rubbish dump, lack of access to clean water, health issues and few kids attending the local school. In order to see these solutions bring change to the community as a whole, however, participants must demonstrate their ability to dialogue and work as a team of global citizens
- The Coffee Bean Game— Participants consider the concept of unjust trade practices, and explore global solutions. Participants engage in the supply chain issues that perpetuate the gap between rich and poor and consider how globalisation may benefit the rich and lead to possible exploitation of the poor.
















Some, Tonnes, None – Macro-economics at its tastiest. A simple, food-based portrayal of the imbalance of resource-consumption on the globe, and the challenge of righting it. By the end of this exercise, they understand why hunger is, by far, the biggest killer in the world today – and may feel spurred on to pursue the betterment of humankind as a consequence.

Monsoon – A rural community must battle weather extremes, crop failure, outbreaks of medical problems, impossible loan conditions, cultural pressure, rejection based on class or tribe, NGO promises, media presence and more. The interweaving of these challenges makes survival a constant struggle and gives participant an idea of the challenges rural societies face around the world.












- Slum Survivor Participants spend 24 hours living as the world's poor: sleeping, eating and working in simulated poverty. They experience the relentless, complex struggle to find food, education, medical care and work and brainstorm ways in which their global citizenship can affect positive change among the world's poorest.
- Level Playing Field A look into macroeconomics and the ramifications of globalisation on developing nations. Students will be able to consider why different parts of the world react differently to the opportunities and challenges brought by globalisation.








The Struggle for Survival – Participants try to earn enough to survive by making paper bags out of newspaper and home made glue. They must earn enough to pay for rent, food, sanitation, medical needs and, if they are fortunate, education. Those that cannot make it end up in the hands of a loan shark. This game throws participants into the hopelessness and intricacy of the poverty web and encourages them to think of holistic and sustainable solutions for the challenges of poverty.

Video ArcAid (Online) - Online simulations and fun resources relating to globalisation, the world's economy, and the disparity of wealth. Students can explore the challenges of globalisation in a short period of time.














- Environmental Development Challenge Reviews the impact of localised pollution and



Students participate in many ways:

- Volunteering: Students volunteer with us, 10am-5pm, Tuesday to Saturday
- Curriculum Participation: we provide a weekly 'subject' for a selection of Hong Kong schools.
- **Projects:** for scores of schools eager to commit to an undertaking amongst students and faculty.
- **Field Days:** for thousands of students whose teachers bring them for a service experience, often on a repeated basis.
- Internships: for students over 16 years: 6 weeks full time volunteer service undertaken. In 2007, 90 interns completed, on aggregate, 1,845 days of service.
- Service Certificates: Students also have the option to fulfill service hours to earn silver (70 hours) and gold (140 hours) certificates. In 2007, 157 students completed these certificates.
